Mental Health and Estates

Elections: The Judge of Probate is the Chief Election Official for the County. During 2022, our office managed three county-wide elections, including the May 24, 2022, Primary Election, the June 21, 2022, Primary Runoff Election, and the November 8, 2022, Presidential General Election.

Mental Health: Mental health commitments are held weekly by the court. During the hearing, the court must determine if the respondent is mentally ill and requires treatment. The proceedings operate under the State of Alabama mental health laws, and the court hears emergency requests for mental health observations, evaluations, and potentially mental health hospitalizations. During the past year, the court heard 95 cases involving involuntary commitments. The number of cases in 2022, as compared to 2021, remained essentially the same. Our office works closely with our partners at East Central Mental Health.

Estates: The Probate Court manages court filings for estates and either issues Letters of Administration (Estates without wills) or Letters of Testamentary for probate estates filed with a will. The Chief Clerk of the Court receives filings and monitors all active cases to ensure the required documentation is filed and is in order. In 2022, the court received 127 petitions for Probate.

Guardianships and Conservatorship: The Macon County Probate Court hears all petitions to initiate, modify, and terminate guardianships and conservatorships for minors and adults. Our office usually works with the Macon County Department of Human Resources or the East Central Mental Health agency.

MACON COUNTY COMMUNITY RALLIES FOR HEALING

An intergenerational meeting was held at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Tuskegee, Alabama on Thursday, April 20, 2023, to plan the healing strategy for students, parents, and citizens of Macon County to mitigate the tragedy that occurred at the 16th Birthday Party in Dadeville, Alabama. The participants, from diverse sections of the county, shared their concerns about not only what happened, but why it happened.

Sheriff Andre Brunson provided an update on the details of the case but was limited as to how much he could share based upon the investigation procedures and Alabama State laws. However, his message was clear when he stated, "We all must come together and operate as one unit in order to save our children and this community." He also said, "Crimes do not take place in front of police and sheriffs. Crimes are committed in the neighborhoods and that citizens should not be afraid to report or help in an investigation".

Citizens shared their concerns about:

- The class and cast that have caused social division based on zip codes.
- The lack of recreational, sports, and other activities in the County that will keep youth occupied in a productive manner.
- The lack of concrete support to parents because, as the African Proverb exclaims, it takes a village to raise a child.
- The lack of adequate medical, psychological, and counseling services to help our youth negotiate a more complex society.
- The lack of respect for students by some teachers in the school system often discourages as oppose to encouraging students.
- The need for more active participation by ministers of churches by opening the doors of the church for neighborhood programs and activities.
- The lack of teaching history and values that made Macon County great is imperative and all teachers and administrators must know the Booker T. Washington philosophy of head, heart and hand.
- The lack of businesses that provide goods and services to avoid the need to travel distances to get them in other jurisdictions.

While participants talked about what is lacking, they talked enthusiastically about what citizens can do to change things with a focus on the youth:

1. Establish academic tutorials for grades K-12.
2. Establish Saturday schools to help teach Life Skills, manners, and other expertise needed in the work world.
3. Embrace our parents who struggle to work and raise a family by developing a system of support.
4. Educate our community about laws and policies that impact their lives and how to manage in a basically racist society.
5. Implement recreational programs that can be included in the school curriculum and in after school and summer programs.
6. Work with Tuskegee University, the Park Service and the National Forest that help our youth at all ages appreciate nature, learn to fish, camp, and do other fun things.

The following actions were agreed to:

1. A written plan for youth will be submitted to Dr. Williams and when appropriate, the Board of Education.
2. All political leaders will be held accountable for finances that are to be used to support communities, economic, health services and safety.
3. We will work together, without pay, to implement programs and projects and grants will be used to supplement the work as opposed to waiting to find a grant to begin.
4. Engage the youth in planning and implementing so that they will learn what and how to do when they become adults.
5. We will embrace parents and support them as they heal from trauma and help to relieve them of the pressures of working two jobs to financially support their families.
6. We will commit to working together to move our county forward and towards healing by using available and relevant cultural, psychological, and spiritual services.

The meetings are facilitated by TM46 and will rotate throughout the county every month so that all citizens will get an opportunity to contribute and express their concerns.

What You Need to Know

Post-COVID conditions can include a wide range of ongoing health problems; these conditions can last weeks, months, or years.

Post-COVID conditions are found more often in people who had severe COVID-19 illness, but anyone who has been infected with the virus that causes COVID-19 can experience post-COVID conditions.



While most people with post-COVID conditions have evidence of infection or COVID-19 illness, in some cases, a person with post-COVID conditions may not have tested positive for the virus or known they were infected.

COVID-19 support groups show that there are many people not considered sick enough to be hospitalized - yet they are experiencing symptoms worse than the flu.

COVID-19 is neurotoxic it is one of the first illnesses capable of crossing the blood-brain barrier. **This is why many people have neurological problems.**

DYSAUTONOMIA

Dysautonomia is a term for a group of disorders that share a common problem - that is, an autonomic nervous system (ANS) that doesn't function as it should. The ANS is the part of the nervous system that controls involuntary body functions (**functions you don't consciously control**) like your heart rate, blood pressure, breathing, digestion, temperature, hormonal / bladder / sexual and many other functions. When the ANS doesn't work the way it should, it can cause heart and blood pressure problems, and breathing trouble.

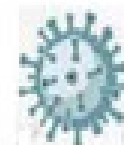
Is This the End of the Pandemic?? (but 250 people are still dying each day!!)



On Monday, April 10, 2023, behind closed doors in the White House, President Joseph Biden signed into law, Bill H.J. Res 7: **Relating to a national emergency declared by the President on March 13, 2020.**



Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, the national emergency declared by the finding of the President on March 13, 2020, is here by terminated.



What does this mean??



(from *The Washington Post* - April 10, 2023) The US has started unwinding its Covid-19 crisis measures that have expanded access to health care for millions of people since the beginning of the outbreak in the country in 2020. President Joe Biden on April 10 signed into law a measure that terminated the country's national emergency order. The White House on May 11 plans to end a separate, more consequential public health emergency and disband its Covid response team. A policy that increased health coverage for low-income people has already been discontinued. So has the federal government's purchase of Covid vaccines and treatments. While some rules around telehealth will remain relaxed, others are being tightened up again.

According to the C.D.C. Covid has killed more than 1.1 million people in the US as of early April. About 250 people are dying each day, compared with about 3,400 at the peak in January 2021. The virus is still here!

Emergency Use Vaccines - In February 2020, then-Health Secretary Alex Azar issued an emergency declaration allowing the Food and Drug Administration to grant emergency use authorization for Covid products. No plans have been announced for terminating this declaration, which has made Covid vaccines, treatments and diagnostics - which otherwise might have taken years to bring to market - available more quickly. Should the declaration be revoked, so will the emergency clearances for those products. With that in mind, many companies, like Pfizer, Moderna and Gilead, have sought to get their products approved through formal, more permanent pathways.



Free Testing Ends - Medicaid will continue to cover at-home and PCR tests until September 2024. Four free rapid Covid tests per household from the Strategic National Stockpile can be ordered at covid.gov/tests.

Directions:

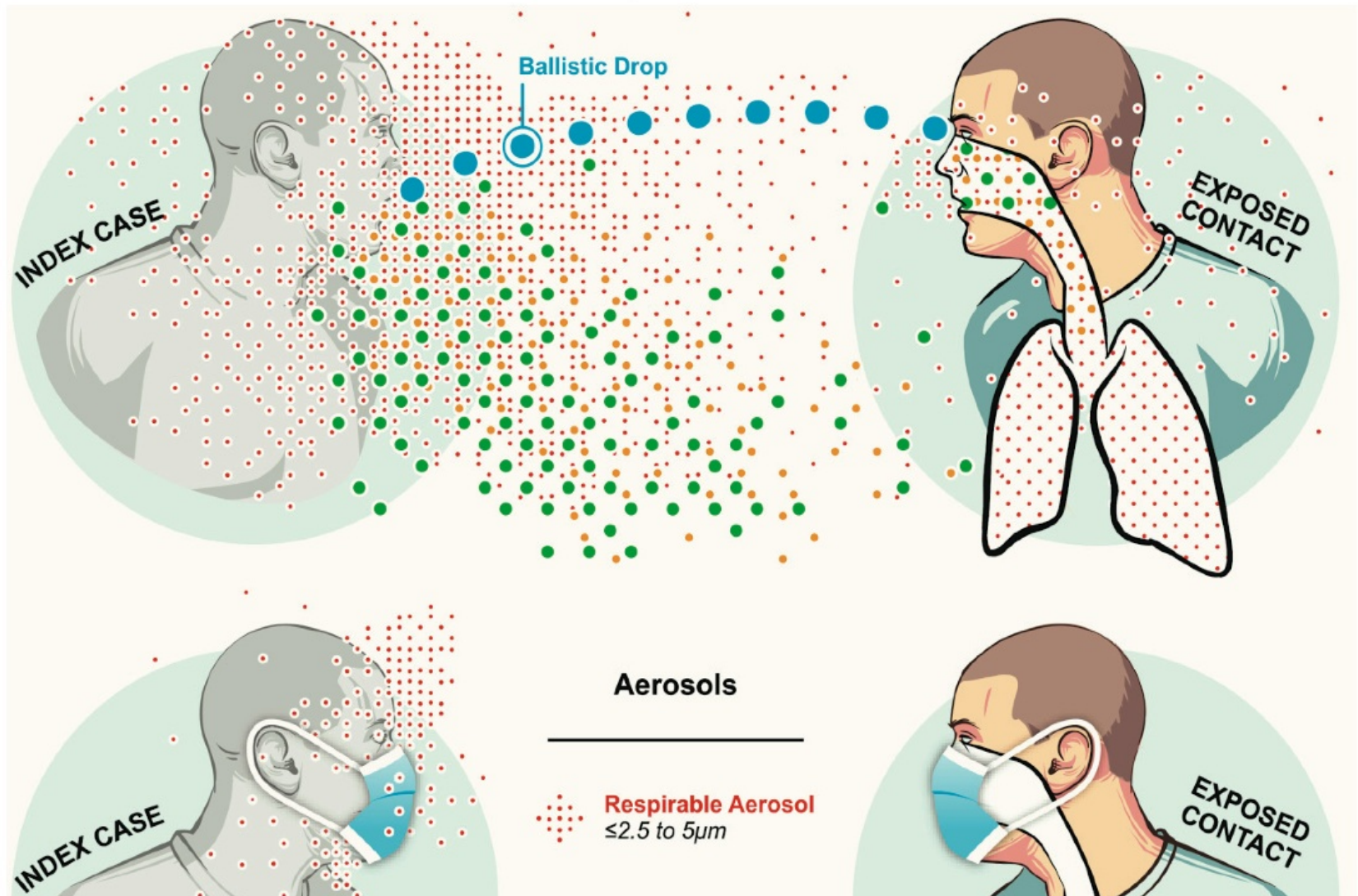
Shred cabbage and carrots. Mix chipotle and French dressing together. Add all ingredients together and stir well. Serve immediately or chilled.

All About The Task Force



When we recognized that multiple organizations were working in silos to address COVID-19 issues in Macon County, we made a decision to act in the greater good of the entire community and come together under one umbrella. This was the impetus for the Macon County Community Partners Task Force, a consolidation of efforts involving several local entities.

The Macon County Community Partners Task Force meets weekly on Saturday mornings via ZOOM technology. Management of each meeting is rotated among four community leaders who are responsible for efficient administration of the meetings, which typically attract about 25 individuals representing municipalities, businesses, educational institutions, churches, nonprofits, grass roots organizations and concerned citizens. This is a time to share ideas, resources, and information vital to eradicating COVID-19 in Macon County.

Work conducted by the Macon County Community Partners Task Force involves four strategic goals that model successful efforts utilized by other counties, states and parts of the world engaged in combatting the coronavirus pandemic. The strategic goals are centered on these overarching needs:

- A Comprehensive Healthcare Response
- A Unified Coronavirus Public Policy
- An Efficient Management and Distribution of Resources
- A Centralized and Multi Layered Communication System

The task force has been effective at creating an infrastructure for long-term sustainability. Committees are working on their specific areas and significant cross-pollination is occurring. Family, I’m excited to share Healing House at Peace Place with you!

The Healing House held its Grand Opening on Friday, June 2, 2023 from 1:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. and Saturday, June 3, 2023 from 8:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

For decades, I’ve known my work was to help people heal. I wasn’t sure what it would look like, but finally, I’m doing the work I was born to!

Dr. Charles Drew was the first African American to earn a Master of Medical Science degree from Columbia. He wrote a dissertation on "Banked Blood" while working as a resident at Columbia University Presbyterian Hospital. He described the technique he developed for the long-term preservation of blood plasma. Before his discovery, blood could only be stored for 2 days, however he separated the plasma from the red blood cells and refrigerated them separately up to a week. He also discovered that plasma could be used in place of blood, regardless of a person's blood type.

Dr. Drew

He created the concept of Blood Banks and was the first director of the Red Cross Blood Bank program. He resigned from this position when he was asked to separate white people's blood from colored people's blood.

Dr. Drew directed the Tuskegee Veterans Hospital Board of Surgeons.

Dr. Alvin P. M. Hall, Sr. was the first certified psychiatrist in the State of Ohio. He was a Diplomate with the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, and a Fellow with the American Psychiatric Association.



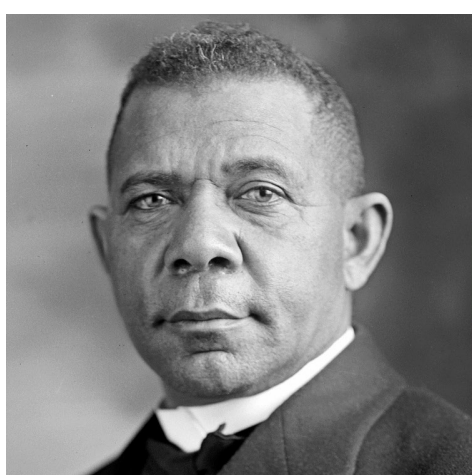

He served in the Tuskegee Veterans Hospital Psychiatric Division, and lived in the Hospital's Residence Circle.

Dr. Avis W. Caliman was the Chief of the Tuskegee VA Psychiatric Services. He also served as the Chief Civil Rights Advisor to the Veterans Administration Chief Medical Director. He later served as one of the first African Americans in the field of Equal Employment Opportunity and Affirmative Action for all Veterans Hospitals for 22 years. He was a founding member of the Association of Black Psychologists.






